SAILS and the Overdrive E-Audio Product

The 90 minute Overdrive presentation given to the SAILS members on January 19th was met with great enthusiasm by everyone in attendance. The members decided they wanted SAILS to begin investigating the feasibility of the network providing patrons with the ability to download popular audiobooks to MP3 players and home computers.

A committee of volunteers was formed by network president Robin Glasser. The members of the committee are: Carole Julius (Carver), Debbie Batson (Plympton), Danielle Bowker (Middleboro), Melissa Campbell (Plainville), Nancy Cappellini (Hanson), Olivia Melo (Rochester), Robin Glasser (Norfolk), Sharon St. Hilaire (Seekonk), Debby Conrad, and Laurie Lessner. The committee has been directed to Review the proposal from Overdrive along with accompanying documentation for the purpose of making a recommendation to the membership about purchase of the Overdrive product. The committee is specifically charged to make recommendations regarding funding, initial and long term costs and addressing policy questions raised by directors.

To prepare background information for the committee, SAILS posted a patron survey to get a measure of patron interest. 46% of the patrons who currently borrow audiobooks indicated that they would also be interested in being able to download audio books. 22% of the respondents who do not currently borrow audiobooks said they would be interested in the download option. Libraries currently offering this service have reported very enthusiastic patron response. We hope we will be able to make a final report to the network by the March newsletter.

SAILS to Beta Test PayPal Electronic Bill Payment Option

Unicorn 2003.1.4 includes the ability to allow patrons to pay outstanding bills using the My Account option in iBistro. Buttons on the Review My Account window in iBistro and iLink allow patrons to use PayPal, an online payment service, to pay their library bills. PayPal accepts credit cards or direct debit from the patron's bank account.

After processing the payment, PayPal sends an Instant Payment Notification (IPN) to Unicorn, which then updates the patron record. The bills are paid. However, due to processing time, users will not see the payment immediately in Review My Account.

The option does allow individual libraries to set up PayPal accounts so payments will be sent directly to each library. As we will be beta testing this product, we expect it will take some time before we actively market this service to patrons. If it is successful this will provide users with an easy way to pay for outstanding library fees using credit and debit cards without requiring SAILS to store credit information in its database.

Q: We find that when searching ibistro, 95 percent of the time patrons want books not web sites. Yet they must type "NOT WEB" every time or get lots of unwanted information. Why can't the search default to books? If they want web sites, they can type "AND WEB" or "ADD WEB". This would be less confusing and less disappointing.

A: A solution you can use now would be to direct your patrons to the "Advanced Search" page. This way, they can search for just books by selecting "Books" from the format drop-down list.

The most practical bit of information I gleaned from the program was from the Santa Monica Library. They created a LAN night, for teens in their community. It sounded great! Obviously it isn't do-able for everyone, but, in a nutshell, this is what they did. They set up all the pc's in their library (30 or so). They purchased and loaded the game Counterstrike (military game—yes, lots of blood). The party was conducted after library hours, from 6—11 pm.

At 3pm, there were kids—teenage boys—lined up around the block, waiting to get in! Only 2 girls came, and one was there with her boyfriend. The library bought pizzas, had soda and candy and made a big mess for the custodian, but everyone had a wonderful time! They were surprised that so many kids showed up, and more surprised at how personable the teens were. They wanted the adults to join in on the fun and the parents were grateful that the kids had a safe place to go.

They also saw that Instant Messenger was used by all, even for kids sitting next to each other. They were IM'ing and talking at the same time. For the kids who didn't have an available pc, they set up a screening of Anime.

They want to do this again, and came up with a laundry list of items to be aware of, including knowing if the HVAC system is on a timer. In CA it got pretty hot at night when the air conditioner went off! They're also going to have poetry slams, Yu-Gi-Oh tournaments for the younger kids, and more amine showings. Although this didn't increase circ, it did give the teens a place to go and changed their image of the library. Many of the teens joined the library's "teen advisory council".
