tion, which also includes a history of the cranberry industry. Rochester has a 1997 town survey, including some cool cemetery pictures. Hanson included their Historic Military Registers and Historical Accounts, reproduced from their print publications.

into paying more for library services? If libraries can't afford the service, and start leaving the network, SAILS will not be able to continue. We all feel very altruistic about our profession, but in the long run, it comes down to money. Rather than ask for the line item to be restored, how about asking for it to be close to where it was two years ago: 96% higher than it is currently. Then you may be able to see affordable assessments.

Last year SAILS worked hard to identify cost-cutting measures and we've already scaled back to just the core services. We can't do that again. We need your support, and a great turnout at the State House can really make the difference. Your Representatives want to see that you care enough to be present. If you don't take a day to support your libraries, why should they?

Remember, gather together your Trustees, Friends and patrons and get them to the State House on April 7th. If you don't want to drive into Boston, you don't have to. Get on the Bus! with the Somerset Friends and forget the hassle of parking and the Big Dig.

The Future of Online Catalogs

FRBR is an acronym you may soon add to your vocabulary. It stands for Functional Requirements for Bibliographic Records. Basically it is a way of categorizing bibliographic records to simplify retrieval for patrons. It is pronounced “Ferber”.

For example, when you look in iBistro for the title Hamlet, you’ll find almost 100 titles. Many of these are virtually the same text, yet by a different publisher. Does the patron want to see separate entries for the Oxford University Press and Cambridge University Press, among others. How much easier would it be if you could see these almost identical titles grouped together under one umbrella? They could even place a hold on the title group, rather than wondering if one editor is different from the next. This doesn’t take away the ability to view the separate records, just leaves the choice to the patron on how specific they would like to be in their request.

Built into this “hierarchical” system is the difference between various “expressions” of a work. This could mean that an original version of a text is classified differently from the critical interpretation or a translation. At the bottom of the hierarchy is the “manifestation” itself, meaning the actual copy of the item you have in your library.

By enabling the system to create the “work” level the specific title information is retained, yet the patron is able to simplify the search and drill-down to the item they are really looking for, rather than scroll through 20 pages of titles. OCLC has been testing on WorldCat with an algorithm they created and Library of Congress is going to be including FRBR in the next revision of AARC, so your future will contain FRBR!
