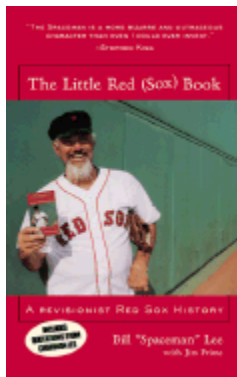

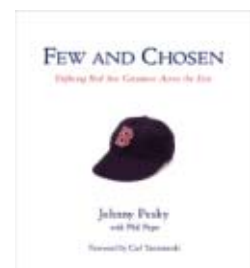

Proxy Checkout Reminder

The proxy checkout is still NOT WORKING. What does this mean? If Patron B comes in to checkout an item on hold for Patron A, the hold does not get canceled for Patron A even if you select the option to Check out and cancel hold. This is a known issue. You have to cancel the hold for Patron A.

This is very confusing, because the hold "appears" to be cancelled off the patron's record, but the item still has the hold attached, and it will display on the RHA report, but when you try to look at it in the patron record, it's not there.

Hold Properties

The past few weeks we have continued to find holds placed with the range of "library", not "group", as they should be. Why is this a problem? Say your patron requested a DVD with 195 holds. Your library doesn't own a copy. Your patron will be passed over multiple times until your library's copy is available to fill the hold. But your library doesn't own a copy. That's the big problem—the hold will NOT be filled! If you do own a copy, they just get passed over until your copy is available to fill the hold. So remember to check every Workflows pc in the library, even tech!

Non-Holdable Items to SAILS Cataloging

Request slips for non-holdable items now include the stamped note, “Non-holdable, please send item with this request slip”. We cannot do original cataloging for any items with only a copy of the title page and verso, container or case. We need to have the item in front of us in order to create all the necessary information, including subject headings, for each bibliographic record. In addition to creating subject headings, we must also look at other pertinent information to catalog. For example, we have to see the books for the complete physical description. We need to watch the title frames and credits for videocassettes and videodiscs. Often, we also need to watch parts of these videocassettes and videodiscs for more detailed information. We also need to use the CD-ROMs in our computers to determine their content.

Do not check out these items to SAILS Cataloging at your library. These non-holdable

items must be put in transit to SAILS. When libraries send these materials in the delivery without first putting them in transit, neither SAILS nor the libraries have any way of tracking them. Once the materials arrive at SAILS, they are checked out to SAILS Cataloging. When we are finished cataloging them, we check them in and they are put in transit to the libraries.

Why Haven’t We Upgraded Yet?

It’s Friday, September 10th. SAILS has told pc support libraries to leave their workflows stations on over the weekend, so they can get the Workflows upgrade. The circ staff has been trained. The BORG (cataloging committee) went through the new version on the test server. A message was posted for patrons, telling of the anticipated down-time. Everyone’s ready for the change. 3 PM, Debby gets a call from Sirsi Client Care saying, “STOP!” Well, we were very thankful that they told us to stop. The version we were going to move to wasn’t functioning properly with larger sites, as another network discovered. So our upgrade was delayed. In the mean time, SAILS installed more memory into the Sirsi server, in preparation for the latest version.

Sirsi has been testing Unicorn 2003.1.4, and the pre-release documentation was just sent to SAILS. One major change is that the you will still be able to **search for patrons by browsing**, as you do now. You’ll also have the new search option of looking up by phone number.

We’re now going to look over the documentation, and as soon as the software is available, load it on our test server. We’ll perform thorough testing before we set a date to install it into production. We will give everyone a good two weeks notice before installing, and will republish all of the instructions we originally had available to you.

Newsbank, a database is provided by SEMLS with funds administered by the Mass. Board of Library Commissioners, provides information on special topics.

One of the current Special Topics is **Presidential Campaign 2004**, which gives links to all sorts of different aspects of the Presidential election including the debates, the primaries, party strategies, the conventions, profiles of the candidates, and much more.

NetLibrary Titles:

The Complete Idiot's Guide to Impeachment of the President by Steven D. Strauss examines the history of impeachment and covers the possible impeachment of President Clinton and what it would have meant to the country. *The Complete Idiot's Guide to Office Politics* by Laurie Rosakis tells you how to get ahead in corporate America in the form of a humorous instructional book.
